

# ALL STEEL CAR ATTRACTS MUCH ATTENTION HERE

NO HANDSOMER CAR  
EVER IN THIS CITY

TO REMODEL FACTORY  
TO ASSEMBLE CARS

Half Dozen Cars Now Being  
Assembled at Factory—  
Will Soon Employ  
Hundreds of Men.

The new All-Steel motor car, which arrived in this city yesterday, is attracting much attention and hundreds of people visited the factory of the company yesterday afternoon and today to see this beautiful new machine. To say that all are delighted with it is to put it in the mildest sort of way. It seems to be the universal verdict that nothing handsomer or more durable has ever been seen in Macon. It is, truly a wonderful car and for a moderate priced machine, it is believed has no equal in the country.

While the car is the design of Oliver E. Barthel and Cecil A. Taylor, two of the best known auto designers and engineers in the world, yet it is made after the plans of the officers of the All Steel Company and is the result of careful experiment and much investigation. Judge Williams, president of the company, spent much time in Detroit, while the car was being designed, and the present machine is largely of a design suggested by him at that time from plans made by the company here before the visit of Judge Williams to Detroit.

The lines of the car are of the most graceful sort and are what is known as Yacht lines.

W. C. Duersten, who is production manager for the company, brought the car home from Detroit, coming by way of Chicago. He stated today that because of the beauty of design, the graceful outline and other splendid points about the car, and because there was an unusual individuality and distinction to it, it attracted much attention in Chicago. It was seen by many experts in that city and all pronounce it a wonderful machine.

The parts for ten other sample cars are now being received at the factory and the work of assembling them was started this morning. Officers of the company stated today that the machinery necessary for a

modern and up-to-date assembling plant would be purchased at once and installed at the factory. They state that they will have one of the most thorough and complete equipments for this work in the country. The factory building will be remodeled for this purpose and an expert engineer to handle this work will be here Monday.

Mr. Duersten, who will have full charge of the production end of the business, stated this morning that they hope to have a large number of cars assembled within a few months and had orders in now for the parts for 600 additional machines. Just how soon they will get these depends on the ability of the manufacturer to get material.

He stated that much of the machine would be finished here and that the finishing and assembling plants would employ a large number of men, many of them experts. When the plant here is in full operation, which would probably be within the year, it would require at least 300 men to operate it.

The company has already booked orders for a large number of cars, enough to keep them going in full operation for two years, Mr. Duersten stated. Some weeks ago they booked one order for 6000 cars.

No time will be lost in getting the plant here in operation, and all connected with it are now sure that it will be a great success and the most stupendous enterprise ever known in this part of Missouri.
